ARCHBOLD SPORTS HALL OF FAME

With Archbold High School running out of wall space for the next hall of fame class, the school and Rotary, which sponsors the Sports Hall of Fame, are looking for a new way to honor next year's inductees.

John Townsend (third from the right), president of a company called VitalSigns of Dublin, Ohio, explained how technology could solve the problem and present even greater opportunities for more information about Archbold athletics and hall of fame inductees than the current plaques on the high school wall could ever do.

The company offers several display opportunities, including a wall mount like the one pictured above that Townsend brought to the August 23 Rotary meeting, as well as a floor kiosk and custom-built wall enclosure. Most schools choose to use a 55-inch interactive screen that is connected both to the cloud where all the data is stored and a memory box in back of the screen that the system uses if the cloud connection is lost

temporarily. Information and photos of the current hall of fame members would be loaded into the system and future classes could include more photos and even a highlights video of their performances as well as video from the Hall of Fame ceremony of the presenter's introduction and the inductee's acceptance speech.



Townsend explained that many schools have pages of school record holders for every sport, a summary of

every team's annual game results with team picture. In other words, VitalSigns uses technology to communicate as much of the school's sports history as the school wants to share. Best of all, the information can be linked to the school's website and accessed from anywhere in the world.

He said that his company will train someone at the school on how to use the system and enter data. Most schools, he said, chose to do all of their data entry. Depending on how much of the school's athletic history that it wants to enter, it may take several years to load all of the data from every year.

However, the biggest selling point is how well received the technology is among people of all ages.

To help fund next year's Archbold Sports Hall of Fame program and the cost of switching from plaques on the wall to an interactive video screen system, Archbold Rotary has planned a dinner with wine and beer tasting for Saturday evening, October 12 at Leisure Times Winery near Napoleon. The \$50 ticket includes dinner and the tastings, and there will be no raffles or drawings. Persons interested in attending should contact Rotary president Royal Short at Archbold High School. Up to 150 tickets will be sold for the event.



UNITED STATES

As many as 1 in 3 children in the United States say they have been bullied at school. In suburban Denver, a Rotary anti-bullying program has reached more than 2,000 elementary school pupils. The Peaceful Schools Program, developed by the Rotary clubs of Denver Southeast, Highlands Ranch (Littleton), and Parker, was created in 2014 by Carole Baumbusch. A template created by Operation Respect, a nonprofit focused on helping children develop into ethical and compassionate adults, was adapted to add a Rotary twist: "It teaches character development using The Four-Way Test," Baum-busch says. The program is delivered by high school students, who are trained by Rotarians.





LIMA ROTARY CLUB SCHOLARSHIPS

Lima Rotary Club enriches our community in a number of ways, two of them are with the grants we give each quarter to nonprofit organizations and with quarterly scholarships for non-traditional students who are attending an institute of higher learning in Allen County. On Monday, August 19, the Scholarship Committee awarded \$1,000 scholarships to nine students who are pursuing degrees in Healthcare Administration, Early Childhood Education, Registered Nursing, Registered Dietician and an AA as an Executive Administrative Assistant. To-date the club has award 1022 scholarships for a total of \$753,250.

Also, at the same meeting, the Lima Rotary Foundation presented grants to the Lima Symphony Orchestra for \$3,865, DARE for \$2,000, the High Octane Drumline for \$2,000, and the Soldiers of Honor Boxing program for \$2,000.
