





- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society As a Rotarian, how can you put these ideals into action?


Consider these suggestions:



District 6600 Environmental and Sustainability Initiatives

In addition to the speaker list, I can arrange for other environmental sustainability speakers to meet with your club. My intention is to stimulate thoughts, opinions, and discussions among Rotarians on environmental issues so that we can develop shared positions on Rotary’s environmental efforts. “High Five” to the Defiance Rotary Club! Karen Soubyrand is a spokesperson for the Citizens Climate Lobby. She recently spoke to the Defiance Rotary Club. The following is Karen’s message as it appears in *The Blade* Opinion section:

Most of the today’s news coverage include both the challenges created by global warming and fear mongering that the answer to reducing emissions will somehow drive the average American family into a ditch. The truth is that the simple carbon fee and dividend legislation will both reduce emissions quickly and protect American families. The protection lies in the monthly dividend that every American will receive, equally, regardless of income level.

This dividend will be funded by the fees collected on fossil fuels at their source. Middle class and poorer families incur similar direct energy costs (gasoline, home heating and electricity) as wealthier families. But they do not incur as many indirect costs – they have less buying power and therefore, have a smaller carbon footprint. The result is that when middle income and poorer families receive their monthly cash dividend, affected also by a lower tax rate, those families will have netted more money than costs incurred.

Economists calculate that the monthly dividends will benefit 61 percent of American households: they will receive more cash each month than they will incur in increased expenses. None of us likes to be told how to live; on that we can all agree. The

beauty of carbon fee and dividend is that all families and individuals can live any way that they choose. No one is saying that we cannot own big houses, drive gas-powered vehicles or travel by air. Likewise, no one will tell us how to spend our monthly dividends; we can spend them in any way that we choose.

So unlike “Cash for Clunkers” or other well-intentioned but expensive-to-implement and narrow-in-focus plans, carbon fee and dividend allow for all families to decide for themselves what is best for them. Maybe they already have a gas-efficient vehicle and an efficient house, so maybe they will decide to use the funds from their dividends for education, or health insurance. Or perhaps to pay down debt, save it for a rainy day, or take a vacation.

Carbon fee and dividend is simple, fair, and effective. It has the additional benefit of putting pressure on other countries to follow suit which as we all know, is imperative if we are to have a livable world. Please call your Representative Robert Latta or Marcy Kaptur today to learn where they stand on this critical issue. Encourage them to act now.


Ada – Annual Holiday Food & Wine Pairing

My Very Own Blanket – Service Project and Contest among the five districts in Ohio




